


CARES ACT

Summary

Health Services

- > \$150 billion for hospitals and medical centers to handle surging caseloads;
- \$10.5 billion for the Department of Defense, including \$1.4 billion for deployments of the National Guard and \$1 billion for the Defense Production Act to help the fast-track production of needed medical supplies to combat the coronavirus;
- \$4.3 billion for the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) to support federal, state, and local public health agencies to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus;
- \$11 billion for vaccines, therapeutics, diagnostics and other medical needs to help discover a cure and treatment options for the virus;

Human Services

> \$25 billion+ for food stamps and other food assistance programs;

- \$900 Million for the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help low income households pay their heating and cooling bills.
- > \$5 billion is provided for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program;
- \$1 billion in additional CSBG funding for states to serve individuals up to 200% of the federal poverty line instead of normal law (125% of the federal poverty line);
- > CARES Act extends the TANF block grant and contingency fund through November 30, 2020;
- > \$450 million to help food banks with increased need;

Transportation:

- > \$56 million to the Essential Air Services (EAS) and Rural Improvement Fund;
- \$25 billion for transit systems;
- > \$10 billion in grants to help our nation's airports;



CARES ACT Summary (Cont.) Housing: > \$3 billion to help more than 4.5 million low-income households in HUD assisted housing to avoid eviction; Agriculture > \$9.5 billion to the Department of Agriculture to support agricultural producers; **Emergency Management** > \$45 billion for FEMA Disaster Relief Fund; > \$100 million for Emergency Management Performance Grants; Police and Fire > \$850 million in Byrne-JAG grants for state and local law enforcement and jails; > \$100 million for Assistance to Firefighter Grants; Library Services > \$50 million for the Institute of Museum and Library Services, including grants to states, territories, and tribes to expand digital network access, purchase internet accessible devices, and provide technical support services; Elections > \$400 million to help states as they prepare for elections amid the virus; COLORADO **Department of Local Affairs** 6
