Some of the projects that I dreaded most out of the gate ended up being the most interesting and/or beneficial to my long-term career development. At the same time, learning how to say "no" is critical to ensuring that all of your commitments are receiving appropriate attention (better to do an excellent job on three projects than an acceptable job on five).

## What's your proudest moment of your career so far?

Helping one of my teams through a difficult and controversial transfer of their division to another local taxing entity. Enacting the policy decision to make the transfer was difficult and complicated, but we were able to address the major issues and make the transition as smooth as possible.

#### How did you learn to embrace failure?

The key for me has been to accept that failure is a growth opportunity and is an unavoidable part of acquiring any skill. No one is born knowing how to ride a bike. It takes a teacher, practice, and probably some pain to acquire that skill. Failure is not fun (nor should it be), but it is inherent in learning and striving to be better.
